Examine the influence of political opinion on governmental systems in the United States. Explain theories, practices and roles of bureaucratic systems in the federal government. Describe the role of the mass media in shaping and informing public opinion and the policy-making process. Explain the structure and function of political party organizations. Assess the importance of citizen participation in American politics. Explore how political culture has influenced governmental institutions and political behavior in the United States.
