Description:	Meets MnTC Goal Areas 2 and 3. This course explores issues related to human biology with reference to genetics, nutrition, health, disease or other contemporary issues. Elements of molecular, cell and organismal biology are introduced as needed to understand the topics studied. This course is intended for non-science majors and consists of lecture and laboratory components.

Demonstrate an understanding of scientific theories in human biology (e.g., homeostasis, cell theory, levels of organization). Identify the human body organ systems and their general function in homeostasis. Relate an understanding of the relationship between the environment and homeostasis. Evaluate societal issues related to human biology from a natural science perspective. Develop informed opinions about policies related to human biology. Use the scientific method to solve problems. Communicate results orally and/or in written format.
