Identify the dispositions available to youthful offenders including extended juvenile jurisdiction and certification. 10. Examine the actions that are required when processing juvenile offenders. 11. Analyze how traffic citations are processed for juvenile offenders. 12. Interpret that a juvenile's conditional waiver of rights regarding statements must be viewed within the totality of circumstances at the time the waiver is given.
