

HIST1301 - World History: Ancient to 1500s

Description:	Meets MnTC Goal Areas 5 and 8. This course provides an introductory survey of the global story of humanity, from its prehistoric origins to the emergence of global commerce. Topics include the first civilizations, development of diverse world religions, and technological, political, artistic and philosophical contributions of past cultures across the world. Particular emphasis is given to the many ways in which geographically distinct peoples have interacted and influenced each other since ancient times.

Compare and contrast the diversity of societies from Africa, Australia, Eurasia, Polynesia and the Americas. Investigate historical sources, distinguishing primary from secondary sources. Communicate effectively using historical evidence and methods of analysis. Analyze and understand the diversity of peoples within their distinctive historical contexts.
