

IPP2214 - Intro to Ethics and Decision-Making for Interpreters

Description:	The interpreting profession requires interpreters to respond to a wide range of difficult situations in an ethical manner. This course introduces ethical constructs within the field of interpreting and focuses on ethical dilemmas that require interpreters to use decision-making processes in a variety of settings. Students learn strategies for developing multiple approaches to ethical scenarios along with guiding principles and values of the interpreting field.

Examine guiding principles and values of the interpreting field. Identify the environmental demands within interpreting situations. Evaluate personal, professional, and cultural values in various ethical scenarios.
