

## RADT1124 - Radiographic Procedures II

Credits:	4 (2/2/0)
Description:	This course provides students with the knowledge necessary to perform routine and mobile radiographic procedures relative to the urinary system, lower extremity, pelvis, vertebral column and arthrology. Emphasis is on radiographic terms, anatomy, pathology, positioning, manipulation of radiographic equipment and accessories, and patient care considerations. Basic techniques in venipuncture, contrast media types, intravenous medication and emergency response are also included.

Explain radiographic and urographic procedures to patients and family members.</li> <li>15. Apply general radiation safety and protection practices associated with radiologic examinations.</li> <li>16. Distinguish between the types and purposes for arthrographic examinations.</li> <li>17. Identify signs of allergic reactions to contrast media.</li> <li>18. Explain treatment for mild, moderate and severe reactions to contrast media.</li> <li>19. Simulate mobile procedures on a person or phantom in a laboratory setting.</li> <li>20. Describe basic terms related to pathology.</li> <li>21. Describe the causes and manifestations of pathological conditions and their relevance to radiologic procedures.</li> <li>22. Describe imaging procedures used in diagnosing disease.</li> <li>23. Describe the various systemic classifications of disease in terms of etiology, types, common sites, complications and prognosis.</li> <li>24. Describe the radiographic appearance of diseases.</li> <li>25. Identify imaging procedures and interventional techniques appropriate for diseases common to each body system.</li> <li>26.
