Demonstrate an awareness of the individual and covert dynamics of unequal power relations among rural and urban areas, ethnic groups and age-based groups. 8. Describe the experiences and social contributions of those who shape rural American society and culture. 9. Discuss how core groups and marginalized groups differ in their approaches to life in rural America.
