



History of Quality Partnerships


M State's Concurrent Enrollment Program (CEP) has over 30 years of experience serving partner districts and is accredited by the National Alliance of Concurrent Enrollment Partnerships (NACEP). Over the 2022-23 academic year (fiscal year 2023), M State partnered with 38 districts in west central rural Minnesota to provide dual credit courses in the high school classroom, taught by qualified high school instructors who are mentored by M State faculty.






Growth and Development

M State's CEP served over 1,860 students in FY23.




In FY23, 113 concurrent instructors delivered over 300 sections in 15 disciplines.



The number of sections offered includes multiple sections of the same course and ITV courses.

Credits Awarded/Registered

M State concurrent students earned over 14,000 credits during the 2022-23 academic year. Concurrent courses are delivered at no cost to the students in Minnesota. The college saved students and their families over \$2.5 million (based on M State's in-state tuition).




Points of Pride

Credentialing

On July 26th, 2022, the Higher Learning Commission (HLC) communicated that all colleges and universities which had previously received an extension related to concurrent enrollment instructor credentialing now have until September 1, 2025. The decision was made to allow more time for states and institutions to fully ensure their concurrent enrollment instructors have the required credentials beyond the previous extension deadline of September 1, 2023.

This latest extension applies to high school instructors actively teaching within our Concurrent Enrollment Program (CEP), and also opens the door for new instructors to create a professional development plan. New instructors must apply to our program and decisions are made after reviewing each applicant's materials and plan. All high school concurrent enrollment instructors who do not meet minimum faculty credentialing qualifications must have a professional development plan on file with M State's CEP detailing how they will meet full credentialing by the revised deadline of September 1, 2025. *Please note: CEP instructors that do not plan to meet HLC credentialing expectations will be deactivated after the 2023-2024 academic year.*
